earning is a lifelong pursuit. For me, an essential part of learning is reading. I read a variety of materials throughout the day. You could call reading my avocation, and it is critical to my vocation. I read for enjoyment; to increase my professional knowledge; and to learn about my community, state, national and world situations, environment, and culture. Yes, to our younger members—I actually read paper newspapers.

It was while reading that I came across a concept that may be applicable to Phi Eta Sigma. Please draw your attention to the report found at this link: http://www.nationalservice.gov/pdf/06 1016 RPD college full.pdf. While this report is several years old, it provides good information about college student volunteerism.

With its founding in 1923, Phi Eta Sigma has just completed its 90th year of recognizing academic achievement in first-year college

students. For the past six years, Phi Eta Sigma has been developing a philanthropy program. Please be sure to read the article in this *Forum* issue written by one of our student Executive Committee members, Jennifer Vuia, about the national philanthropy: WINGS for Kids, in association with our 2014 convention in Charleston.

Beyond the efforts to raise funds for the WINGS philanthropy, I would like for everyone to consider performing 90 community service hours in a common cause. Even if it is only our new inductees participating, just think of the impact of 30,000 students completing 90 hours of community service in a united cause. That is 2,700,000 hours of community service. Such a commitment could literally make a demonstrative change in a common cause.

So this is a call to consider action. First—Is a common community service project an idea that you, the membership of Phi Eta Sigma, would like for us to consider further? Second—What

would be your suggestions for a common cause? Boys & Girls Clubs and elementary after school programs are just two possibilities. The report on volunteerism mentioned above may provide other ideas.

Phi Eta Sigma could lead the way on a national front by uniting all chapters with a common community service objective. Please discuss this among your chapter membership. I look forward to hearing your input. If there is interest expressed, we may even be able to have a discussion at the upcoming Charleston convention about this possibility. It is exciting to think that "Knowledge is Power" could be a shared community service opportunity for our members. Phi Eta Sigma has inducted more than 1,000,000 members since its humble beginnings in 1923. What would our founders think if they could see us now as a nationally recognized vital and vibrant student honorary? I think they would be very proud indeed.

Attention Advisers Regarding IRS Compliance

As a 501(c)3 non-profit, tax-exempt organization, Phi Eta Sigma is required by the IRS to file a Form 990 tax return each year. Recent changes to federal tax laws require that subsidiaries of such organizations must also file a tax return or be included in a group exemption filing through the parent organization. Over the past few years, the Phi Eta Sigma national office staff has solicited tax information from chapter leaders to ensure that each chapter is in compliance with IRS regulations. Approximately one-third of our active chapters elected to be included in the group exemption through Phi Eta Sigma, allowing us to file the annual tax return on their behalf. For those chapters that elected not to participate in the group filing, we encourage you to check with the business office at your institution and/or consult with a certified tax professional to ensure that your chapter is in compliance with federal tax laws for non-profits.

Phi Eta Sigma Accomplishments and Aspirations

hi Eta Sigma Honor Society is definitely not a stagnant institution, but a dynamic organization comprised of amazing individuals who work hard and aspire to make a difference in the world. Throughout 2013 I was privileged to witness this firsthand as I participated in Society events and meetings.

The newest chapters of Phi Eta Sigma were chartered last spring at Clark Atlanta University in Atlanta, Georgia, and Robert Morris University in Chicago, Illinois. Dedicated chapter advisers and highly motivated students brought about the establishment of these two chapters. Their strong leadership and commitment to academic excellence were evident as they prepared for and conducted the chartering ceremonies and inductions of new members. It was my great honor to speak at both ceremonies and congratulate the charter members of these chapters. (See "New Chapters Installed" in the Chapter News section of this Forum issue.)

At the end of May, members of the Phi Eta Sigma Executive Committee gathered in Philadelphia for their off-convention-year meeting. The national officers, at-large adviser members, and student members of the Committee discussed numerous topics regarding the Society's operations. They assessed the actions and recommendations from the 2012 national convention and made plans for the 2014 national convention in Charleston, South Carolina. (See the Convention News section of this Forum issue.) I was most impressed by the insights and work ethic of the three student

members as they shared ideas, made motions, presented proposals for the upcoming convention, and volunteered for various projects. As the national office prepared for the annual audit at the end of the 2012-2013 school year, we calculated the total number of new inductees for the year was **30,482**. This figure is right on pace with recent years and puts our grand total up to **1,117,636** members inducted since the honor society began in 1923. Our chapter advisers and officers are obviously doing a superb job of identifying and recognizing the high achieving first-year students on their campuses. Congratulations to all!

The Founders Fund continues to grow steadily, once again providing \$295,000 in scholarships and awards for 67 of our most outstanding student members for the 2013-2014 academic year. (See details in the Scholarship News section of this issue.) Now that the increased membership fee of \$25 has gone into effect, the portion of each fee being contributed to the Founders Fund has doubled. This will allow our investments to grow at an even greater rate, enhancing our future scholarships significantly.

Another highlight of 2013 for me was the opportunity to participate in the Midwest Area Regional Conference (MARC) hosted by the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay in October. (See "Regional Conference" in Feature Articles

section of this issue.) UWGB chapter members Amy Schumacher and Libby Suffern served as MARC coordinators, spending countless hours and untold effort to arrange housing, meals, meeting space, and an evening at Lambeau Field, home of the legendary Green Bay Packers. They made the conference sessions highly relevant to the members and advisers in attendance by inviting speakers who addressed leadership and service. I was invited to speak about benefits of Phi Eta Sigma membership and to introduce the 2014 national philanthropy project. Every conference attendee, including myself, left Green Bay that weekend with a sense of accomplishment and purpose. Congratulations to Amy, Libby, and other UWGB chapter leaders on this successful event and a job well done!

At Phi Eta Sigma national headquarters on the campus of Western Kentucky University, our staff has been staying fit throughout the fall semester by climbing stairs to our office on the fifth floor while the building's elevator is being replaced. Fortunately, we are all healthy enough to make the trek each day with no problems. This is especially true of our newest employee, Beth Durbin, a 2005 graduate of WKU with a degree in public relations and marketing. Beth joined our staff as communications/media specialist in August 2013. Her talents and skills have already helped increase our productivity immensely, allowing us to better serve our members and advisers nationwide and to give greater support to the Society's mission.

The tasks involved in achieving goals are not always easy. But the success we experience makes all that hard work worthwhile. It seems just as we achieve one goal, another opportunity materializes. Phi Eta Sigma members dream big. Let's make 2014 another year of making even more dreams become reality.

he unique strength of Phi Eta Sigma is its democratic form of student-led government. Student delegates and chapter advisers convened at the University of Illinois on November 23, 1928, for the first Phi Eta Sigma national convention. From the beginning, Phi Eta Sigma has placed faith in the good judgment of its student members and has found that faith to be fully justified.

The 1970 Louisiana State University convention amended the Constitution and Laws to add a student member to the Executive Committee and elected Larry Jones of Southern Illinois University, who served until the Golden Anniversary Convention, hosted by the University of Illinois in 1973. At the Auburn University convention in 1974, the Constitution

was again amended to elect two student members to the Executive Committee; and the 1980 University of Florida convention increased this number to three.

The Nominations Committee of the 2012 convention in Salt Lake City recommended a team of three student leaders who were elected to serve on the Executive Committee for the next two years. Along with other members of the Executive Committee and the national office staff, these three students are planning and preparing for the 2014 national convention, where they will each conduct leadership workshops. As you meet these student leaders, you will appreciate the strengths they bring to the Executive Committee and to the Society.

Outside of Phi Eta Sigma, Jennifer is a member of Alpha Zeta honorary agricultural fraternity. As a Regents' Scholar, she participates in the Aggie Pals Program, in which she encourages underprivileged children to attend college in their future. She has been named to the Texas A&M Distinguished Student List for her academic performance and has also served as secretary and president of the Texas A&M On to Medicine medical organization. Jennifer volunteered at a graduate laboratory on campus that does chemotaxis research and also did an externship program with the poultry producer Pilgrim's Pride. She is currently participating in the A&M Mediterranean Nutrition and Food Processing program where she will learn the enology, policies, and culinary arts of Italian food processing. CLARK ATLANTA UNIVERSITY


Atlanta, Georgia March 20, 2013

lark Atlanta University (CAU) is a United Methodist Church-related, private, coeducational, residential, and comprehensive urban research university formed in 1988 from the consolidation of two independent historically black institutions—Atlanta University and Clark College. The University offers undergraduate, graduate and professional, and nondegree certificate programs.

The main campus spans 126 acres of land near the heart of metropolitan downtown Atlanta. The University offers 38 major areas of study through four schools—Arts and Sciences,

Business Administration, Education, and Social Work. Phi Eta Sigma joins such distinguished honor societies as Alpha Kappa Mu, Beta Kappa Chi, Psi Chi, and other departmental societies on the Clark Atlanta campus.

The chartering ceremony was held at the Bishop Cornelius Henderson Student Center. Interim Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs James A. Hefner, who previously was instrumental in chartering two other Phi Eta Sigma chapters, gave opening remarks at the ceremony. ROBERT MORRIS UNIVERSITY

Chicago, Illinois June 6, 2013

he 377th chapter of Phi Eta Sigma was chartered at Robert Morris University Illinois, an independent, not-for-profit private, multi-location university offering associate, baccalaureate, and graduate degree programs. Robert Morris University was established in 1913 as Moser School, and in 1965 Robert Morris College was chartered in Carthage, Illinois. In 1975 Robert Morris College merged with Moser School, and the new institution gained accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools in 1986. Between 1988 and 2011, Robert Morris opened nine additional campuses throughout the Chicago metro area and central Illinois. In 2005 Robert Morris College earned university status and became Robert Morris University Illinois.

RMU enrolls approximately 7,000 full-time students on ten campuses in Illinois. The school offers master's degrees in business administration, information systems, and management.

Bachelor degree programs include business administration, professional studies, and applied science. All associate degree programs have a corresponding bachelor degree program in which to matriculate. The University also hosts chapters of Sigma Beta Delta and Tau Sigma honor societies.

Carrie Roath Ernst, chapter adviser, began the chartering ceremony by making introductions, followed by welcoming remarks from Kathleen Suhajda, vice president for academic administration. Phi Eta Sigma Executive Director Elaine Powell gave a brief history and overview of the honor society and then presented the RMU chapter charter to Ms. Ernst. The Abilene Christian University chapter held its spring induction on April 16, 2013.

he **Bernard M. Baruch College** chapter of Phi Eta Sigma had an incredibly successful 2012-2013 academic year, due to a committed drive to organize and participate in a variety of campus events, which made the chapter one of the best-known organizations at Baruch College.

Phi Eta Sigma members livened up the Baruch campus by hosting several phenomenal social events this year such as the Return of the Masquerade, which kicked the year off on a grand note. Hundreds of attendees danced, ate, and partied the night away. The members hosted an incredibly successful raffle to benefit the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life. Another major party held in spring semester was the Saints vs. Sinners party, co-hosted with another honor society at Baruch. Just like the Masquerade Ball, this event raised money through raffles for Relay for Life, and the grand

prize was a Samsung tablet. Overall, Phi Eta Sigma raised around \$1,200 for Relay for Life!

The Baruch chapter held regular, fun, themed general meetings such as "Tiki Bar Luau" and "Bringing Back the 90's." The chapter also collaborated on some memorable events such as West meets East Matsuri, which was a spectacular cultural celebration co-sponsored with the Japan Club at Baruch.

Chapter members helped organize several professional events for Baruch students. For example, *Centsable: Financial Literacy Sense* explored the non-profit world by giving students the opportunity to interact with Misha Kaufman, CEO of Centsable, a non-profit organization that aims to improve financial literacy among New York City high school students.

The Baruch chapter also gave back to the community by regularly organizing volunteer and donation drives for events and organizations, including the Holy Cross Food Pantry, a used book collection drive on campus, and the Hurricane Sandy Relief Fund. This year saw the launch of the Conversation Partners program, through which non-native English speakers of

Baruch's diverse community can now connect with native speakers as conversation partners and friends.

One of the highlights of the year was the induction ceremony, which saw more than 260 students joining the Baruch Phi Eta Sigma community, the largest number ever to be inducted in one year. The event recognized all the successes achieved by the chapter and the goals it would continue to pursue.

The effort put into these events paid off at Baruch College's annual awards ceremony, for which Phi Eta Sigma was nominated in the categories of Best Social Event, Best Collaboration Event, and Comeback Club. The Masquerade Ball won Social Event of the Year, allowing the chapter to end the year on a well-deserved, award-winning note.

he **Boise State University** chapter of Phi Eta Sigma is constantly growing. The chapter has organized several service events. Each month a group of members attends Service Saturday, an on-campus service day hosted by Boise State University. Through

this event they have assisted the Girls on the Run after-school program and helped survey the Boise Greenbelt. The Greenbelt is an iconic recreational facility in the Boise area and a resource used by many people throughout the Treasure Valley. It can be used to bike to work and school and for an evening jog or dog walk. Members volunteered to take count of people using the Greenbelt and record responses to a survey of people who were willing to give feedback on Greenbelt improvement. The gathered data will be presented to the parks and recreation board of Ada County to gain funds for improvements.

BSU Phi Eta Sigma has also participated in annual events such as working with the food bank at Thanksgiving, Rake Up Boise, and the Walk to End Alzheimer's. Their largest event to date was co-sponsoring the Langston Hughes Project's visit to Boise State last April. The Langston Hughes Project featured artist Ron McCurdy playing trumpet to Ask Your Mama: Twelve Moods for Jazz, Hughes' homage in verse and music to the struggle for artistic and social freedom at home and abroad at the beginning of the 1960's. Ron McCurdy performed in the Special Events Center at Boise State campus, and Phi Eta Sigma sponsored this event in conjunction with the English department. It was both a social event and an intellectually stimulating program for all ages, a great opportunity for the chapter to enhance the academic goals of Phi Eta Sigma.



he Florida Gulf Coast University chapter of Phi Eta Sigma had an exciting year. At the Dean of Students' Leadership and Involvement Ceremony, the success of the FGCU chapter was recognized

when former chapter president Claire Gorman was awarded the honorable distinction of President of the Year and chapter member Dayanira Lopez was awarded Emerging Leader of the Year for outstanding work with the chapter. The making of a successful year was primarily due to the success of fall and spring service projects. The chapter was involved in the creation of a library system for the Children's Advocacy Center of Southwest Florida in the fall semester. The spring semester brought an annual event known as Walk, Wheel, and Wobble, a 5K walk/run and 62-mile bike ride. The main goal of the event is to raise funds to find a treatment or cure for ataxia. Ataxia is a neurodegenerative disease that affects the spinal cord and inhibits the ability to walk and talk. Previously the chapter has donated time by volunteering on the day of the event. A popular activity for the UT chapter last February involved a group of members volunteering at the Boys and Girls Club in Knoxville.





he Texas A&M University chapter of Phi Eta Sigma has 2,775 members on campus and hosts many events each semester. Therefore, the chapter instituted an "active" member policy whereby members must attend at least two out of three meetings, one social, and one service event each semester in order to graduate with honor cords. However, members are not dismissed for inactivity; chapter leaders stand by the credo of "once you're a member, you may claim membership for life" and always encourage students to attend activities they host, whether they are active or not. At the first meeting of the semester, 367 members attended. So far this semester, members have hosted a street cleanup and game night, and they wrote letters to deployed soldiers. Additionally, 180 members came to dinner at a local restaurant to participate in a profit share that raises money for scholarships provided by the chapter.

Chapter members offer a free tutoring program for students at A&M. 



Founders Fund Scholars 2013-2014

tatute VII of the Constitution and Laws of Phi Eta Sigma provides that all of the income from the Founders Scholarship

Fund shall be used "to grant annually one Member-Scholar-Leader of the Year Scholarship of \$10,000 and one or more Distinguished Member Scholarships of up to \$7,500 each to members of Phi Eta Sigma. One or more such scholarships shall be designated for students pursuing graduate degrees, one or more such scholarships shall be designated for undergraduate students, and one or more awards of \$1,000 each shall be designated for members of Phi Eta Sigma for use during one year of undergraduate study."

Fund income available for the 2013-2014 scholarships was \$295,000, making it possible to award one \$10,000 Scholar-Leader of the Year Scholarship, six \$7,500 Distinguished Member Graduate Scholarships, thirty-six \$6,000 Distinguished Member Undergraduate Scholarships, and twenty-four \$1,000 undergraduate awards.

The members of the Scholarship Committee were: Mr. Tim Lemper, Chairperson, Indiana University; Mr. Tony Kemp, Mercer University; and Ms. Mary Jo Custer, Syracuse University. The committee used the following criteria in selecting recipients:

- 1. High scholastic record with a minimum 3.5 cumulative GPA.
- Participation in local chapter activities.
- 3. Evidence of creative ability.
- 4. Potential for success in chosen field.
- Letters of recommendation, not to exceed three.

\$10,000 Thomas Arkle Clark Scholar-Leader of the Year Award

Dean Clark, dean of men at the University of Illinois and Senator of Phi Beta Kappa, was one of the three founders of Phi Eta Sigma and our first Grand President, serving from 1927 until 1933.

The eighth recipient of the Thomas Arkle Clark Scholar-Leader of the Year Award is Carl Kirpes, a 2012 graduate of lowa State University. Carl earned bachelor's degrees in mechanical engineering and industrial and manufacturing systems engineering. He is now pursuing a master's degree in systems engineering at lowa State University in Ames, lowa.

Inducted into Phi Eta Sigma in 2009, Carl's first order of business was to plan a leadership retreat and team building experience while serving as president of the lowa State chapter for 2009-2010.

The ISU chapter goal is to attain "More than Recognition" through Phi Eta Sigma membership. Carl's work to redefine Phi Eta Sigma at ISU also included drafting the induction letter, organizing philanthropy events, and preparing for the chapter's signature Charity Skate. He helped his chapter earn national recognition for increasing membership and organizational efficiency during his tenure as chapter president.

Carl contributed an article to the 2013 Forum, describing his participation in Phi Eta Sigma. His chapter at ISU worked toward each of its goals by identifying each member's strengths and utilizing them. Recognizing that individuals' strengths provide the potential, but that teamwork provides the results led Carl to develop a "Reflective Leadership" concept based on the success their chapter experienced through utilizing those individuals' strengths. Carl plans to use his engineering abilities to "transform engineering disciplines and industry to engage more systemically, with greater real-world context, creating solutions that provide greater results and impact"—a goal for which he claims his Phi Eta Sigma experiences have given him a "springboard for success."

\$7,500 Graduate Scholarships

Holding the Standard High: Louisiana State Chapter Honors Its Highest Achievers

niversity College of Louisiana State University hosted the annual Phi Eta ceremony Sigma initiation Thursday, April 18, 2013, inducting 255 freshman scholastic achievers and recognizing recipients of the chapter's L. B. Lucky Award and Senior Award. Presiding over the ceremonies was Margaret Hindman, 2011-2013 chapter president. Assisting Hindman was Carmen Welch, vice president; Nicole Brooks, secretary; and Hunter Starring, historian. The evening began with a reception for the new inductees and guests. Paul Ivey, executive director of the LSU University College and chapter adviser, addressed the audience and presented the awards and plagues to Jesse Clifton, recipient of the L. B. Lucky Sophomore Award, and to Daniel Case, recipient of the Senior Award.

"Phi Eta Sigma is a well-respected honor society of which I am pleased to be the adviser for the LSU chapter," says Ivey. "This year's induction of 255 students is one of our largest and is another means for University College to recognize the academic excellence of our freshmen."

Established in 1959, the L.B. Lucky Award recognizes a Phi Eta Sigma member who achieved the best overall academic performance during the first four semesters of coursework taken at Louisiana State University. Jesse Clifton, the 2013 recipient, is a second year student from

Baton Rouge majoring in political science. During his first two years of enrollment at LSU, Jesse amassed 123 hours of college credit and maintained a perfect 4.0 grade point average. He has aspirations to be involved in policy research as an academician. Clifton is currently president of the LSU International Relations Club.

"Jesse is a remarkable young man who has demonstrated a superior level of academic achievement that warrants his recognition as the outstanding sophomore member of our LSU chapter of Phi Eta Sigma," says Ivey.

In 1992, the LSU chapter instituted a Senior Award to recognize a graduating Phi Eta Sigma senior who has maintained the best cumulative grade point average and overall academic record among the membership. Daniel Case, a senior majoring in physics, mathematics, and economics with a 4.0 grade point average, joined this elite group of scholarship recipients. Case has been a research assistant in the LSU Department of Biological Sciences, a physics tutor, and supplemental instructor for the introductory macroeconomics course. During the summer of 2012, he received a Harvard Origins of Life Initiative Undergraduate Research Fellowship, allowing him to conduct basic research alongside Senior Research Fellow, Dr. Juan Perez-Mercader at Harvard University. This research consisted of building a chemically

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operated Turing machine, which is a device capable of performing complex computations. Upon returning to LSU for fall 2012, he began assisting Dr. Michal Brylinski, assistant professor of LSU biological sciences, doing research on computational biology and investigating how small molecules bind to proteins. Upon his graduation, Case enrolled in graduate studies at Northwestern University in pursuit of a Ph.D. in physics.

"Daniel's impressive research experience and his outstanding academic performance are sound reasons for Phi Eta Sigma to recognize him as our 2013 Outstanding Graduating Senior," states Ivey. "University College, through our sponsorship of this honor society, is proud to support this type of achievement among our LSU graduates."

Since 1928, the LSU chapter of Phi Eta Sigma has inducted more than 10,400 students; and since 1948, some 27 chapter members have received national Phi Eta Sigma scholarships. The most recent LSU recipient was Sophie Martin, a former president of the chapter, who received the \$6,000 Archie L. Lejeune Distinguished Member Scholarship in 2011.

An election was held in late spring 2013 to select the newest officers for the chapter. Serving two-year terms in office for 2013-2015 are the following LSU chapter officers: Andrew Mahtook, president; Hannah McLain, vice president; Emily Riley, secretary; and Austin Bordelon, historian.

Snapshots of Service: The Phi Eta Sigma Impact on Three Different Campuses

or intelligent, motivated, and successful college students, there are numerous opportunities to join academic clubs, organizations, and societies. Too often, this can be done for the sole purpose of adding a line to a résumé or gaining some other tangible reward for membership. Phi Eta Sigma, however, seeks to draw students away from themselves and help use their gifts and talents to serve others. With hundreds of chapters, the work of Phi Eta Sigma is immense, often in collaboration with first-year student programs or freshman experience classes. So here are a few snapshots to provide readers with concrete examples of the type of work in which many of the world's most promising undergraduates are engaging.

Lee University

The Phi Eta Sigma chapter at Lee University in Cleveland, Tennessee, is a relatively new chapter. During the chapter's first four years on campus, Lee University's Office of First-Year Programs has increasingly worked to expand the influence of the Society and its impact on campus.

After the formal induction ceremony in October, each new group of Phi Eta Sigma officers helps organize numerous service-learning

opportunities. Service-learning is not a foreign concept to this chapter. As a graduation requirement and part of the core curriculum, all Lee University students are required to engage in a minimum of eighty service-learning hours and complete academic reflections on those experiences. While students earn two credit hours for service-learning, many of these students go above and beyond this requirement to serve and outreach to surrounding communities and beyond. It is within this framework that the Lee chapter of Phi Eta Sigma operates its own individual service-learning projects. With the help of the Leonard Center, which is the center for service-learning on Lee's campus, chapter members have been involved in a myriad of projects to benefit individuals in the Cleveland community and in southeast Tennessee.

Last fall, for example, members of Phi Eta Sigma assisted local K-12 students with tutoring. They also participated in an "Operation Christmas Child Packing Party." In connecting with Lee's freshman seminar course (GNST 101: Gateway to University Success – or as it is commonly called on campus, "Gateway"), students purchase toys and other items to pack into shoeboxes. These gift boxes are then distributed to children around the world through an

organization called Samaritan's Purse. During the "Packing Party," all forty-one of the freshman seminar classes meet in the gym and pack the boxes with the goods that they have purchased. Over the past few years, Lee's freshman classes have packed approximately 3,000 boxes each year. Members of Phi Eta Sigma have helped organize and prepare the boxes for delivery to Samaritan's Purse.

In addition, Phi Eta Sigma student leadership teams sponsor various socials for members of the chapter. These pizza parties, movie outings, and socials help create opportunities for deeper relationships among members.

Lee University's Office of First-Year Programs actively seeks to hire "peer leaders" from its Phi Eta Sigma chapter. Peer Leaders are upperclassmen who assist the Gateway professors in the freshman seminar classes. In order to apply for the position, students must have at least a 3.5 GPA after completing a minimum of forty-five credit hours. Those who apply must then go through an interview process to see if they have engaged in service-learning activities as well as other social and academic organizations on campus. This process is highly selective, and Phi Eta Sigma members are well represented on the peer-leading team. This is a very natural fit, and Phi Eta Sigma is a perfect place for students to focus on the servant-leadership opportunities on campus.

Finally, when the Lee University chapter conducts officer elections each fall, it fills an

additional position of Chaplain for Phi Eta Sigma. While it is understood that this post is not recognized by the Society nationally, it is an informal position designed to help students grow emotionally, spiritually, and academically.

All of these activities have helped make the Lee University chapter of Phi Eta Sigma an integral part of campus by emphasizing academics and service. The work fits well within Lee University's First-Year Programs office because of its mission to help ensure the success of Lee's freshmen students by connecting them to the university and to each other. Lee's Phi Eta Sigma members have done a superb job of working with new students and upperclassmen to share the vision of the Society at Lee and to further enhance the school's academic rigor and commitment to service-learning.

Florida Gulf Coast University

At Florida Gulf Coast University (FGCU), the Phi Eta Sigma chapter has been in a rebuilding process since 2012. Because of lack of activity from the chapter for a number of years, first and second year students make up the majority of active members. This lends itself to a unique opportunity for outreach to the university's "First Time in College" (FTIC) population. The FGCU chapter is doing this through service, leadership, and personal development opportunities and through programming that carries out the mission of the Office of New Student Programs.

Like Lee, FGCU requires a minimum of eighty service hours to meet the graduation requirement. However, a culture of service has been created at the institution, and many students far exceed the required eighty hours. The FGCU Phi Eta Sigma chapter makes it a goal to help first-year students kick start the service requirement by offering service opportunities that parallel as leadership opportunities. Rather than offering numerous short-term opportunities, the leadership of the chapter has focused on long-term service leadership.

In 2012-2013, the chapter participated in two main service projects, one during the fall semester and one during the spring. In the fall semester, the chapter collected books and monetary donations to paint, decorate, and create a library system for the Children's Advocacy Center of South West Florida—a crisis center that helps sexually and physically abused children.

For the spring semester, the chapter partnered with the Know Ataxia Foundation, an organization dedicated to creating awareness while raising funds for spinocerebellar ataxia (a degenerative disease with no current treatment or cure). Through this partnership, the FGCU Phi Eta Sigma chapter and the Know Ataxia Foundation planned and implemented a 5k walk/run, a 62- or 30-mile bike ride, and a family fun day featuring entertainment, games, prizes, music, and vendors to raise thousands of dollars for ataxia research. In addition to the planning and implementation of the event, Phi Eta Sigma students organized a "Know Ataxia" week on FGCU's campus. During this week, students designed an event each day to raise awareness about spinocerebellar ataxia. These service opportunities allowed members to connect with the Fort Myers community, kick-start their service graduation requirement, and develop as leaders through the planning and implementation process, all of which are important in students' successful transition to college.

In addition to service opportunities, FGCU chapter leaders decided chapter meetings

should encompass more than just business. They added personal growth opportunities for members during each meeting, now known as WOW Meeting Moments. Half of each general meeting is spent focused on some area of personal growth. These have included résumé building, study abroad opportunities, leadership development, time management, eating healthy on campus, and many more. This meeting component has helped provide accurate, useful, and timely information that focuses on the resources of the institution. It has also helped create a better understanding of the factors that impact success in college – part of the mission of the Office of New Student Programs.

Chapter leadership and membership have also found creative, concrete means to reach out to first-year students. This has had a twofold effect by increasing awareness about Phi Eta Sigma to first-year students who may be invited to join the organization and also carrying out the mission of New Student Programs through outreach. These efforts include developing programming in areas FTIC students tend to be (such as the freshman living community), encouraging Phi Eta Sigma members to apply for positions on the Eagle View Orientation staff. and carrying out simple programs such as "You were caught studying by Phi Eta Sigma!" snacks in the first-year residence hall common spaces. There has also been a natural mentorship process happening in the chapter as seasoned members, mostly part of the executive board, are mentoring newly inducted members in the ways of Phi Eta Sigma and the campus culture. This is becoming more institutionalized as 2013 brought the inaugural 10-person leadership board (in addition to the executive board) to help in the decision-making and leadership of the FGCU chapter.

Phi Eta Sigma continues to rebuild and become a known entity on the FGCU campus. In this way, the honor society assists FGCU to serve first-year students, help students successfully transition to college life, connect them to their campus and community, and carry out the mission of New Student Programs.

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The Florida State University chapter members are easy to identify at the Tutoring Extravaganza by their Phi Eta Sigma t-shirts.

The Florida State University

At The Florida State University, members of Phi Eta Sigma have formed a partnership with the Academic Center for Excellence's Learning Studio to provide free tutoring to undergraduates in courses commonly taken during the first year in college. These "Tutoring Extravaganzas" are designed to help students prepare for midterms and final exams while giving chapter members the opportunity to enhance their leadership skills as they work to motivate and encourage first-year students to succeed academically. This service project also affords the opportunity to publicize to first-year students the potential to join Phi Eta Sigma in the spring if they earn a 3.5 or higher grade point average. Coffee and snacks (each having a brief study tip attached) are provided to add to the relaxed yet festive nature of the affair.

The Peer Academic Leader (PAL) program at Florida State provides training and placement for members of Phi Eta Sigma to serve as volunteer peer advisers. Volunteers attend a mandatory 8-hour training series to learn about such topics as university resources, graduation requirements, legislation related to confidentiality, and listening skills. In 2013, thirty trained "PES PALs" assisted approximately 3,000 first-time college students in biological science and exploratory majors during orientation to select and register for their first semester courses.

Each of these programs shows how Phi Eta Sigma's dedication to academic excellence can be used to reach a variety of students campus wide. Chapters can share many common points of emphasis with other institutions while remaining flexible to meet the needs of their individual campus community. Whether a private liberal arts college, a regional university, or a large research institution, Phi Eta Sigma continues to make an impact by encouraging gifted students to better the world around them.

Playing the Games: Philanthropy Supports PE at Utah Schools for the Deaf and the Blind

During the 2011-2012 academic year, Phi Eta Sigma chapters adopted special needs education as its national philanthropy. Eleven chapters participated in philanthropy projects, and the proceeds they raised were donated to the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the Blind (USDB). The USDB is a non-profit organization that has served students with sensory impairments throughout Utah for more than 100 years, leading the way in teaching the deaf and the blind to be self-reliant and contributing citizens of their communities. Student members of the Phi Eta Sigma Executive Committee presented a check for \$5,000 to USDB division director Mike Hillstrom at the 2012 national convention in Salt Lake City.

any children who have disabilities do not know their own possibilities! Sometimes those possibilities are reached through trying things on their own and refusing to live vicariously through others. Three years ago the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the Blind implemented its first adaptive PE program. With help from the Phi Eta Sigma Honor Society, USDB has doubled its efforts to allow children who are in walkers or wheelchairs and have a variety of sensory impairments and multiple disabilities to participate in physical education classes.

Children want to be normal even if they have a disability, and adaptions can help these children to feel that they can still participate and fit in with their peers. Often, children with disabilities suffer from low self-esteem and a feeling



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that they cannot do as many activities as their non-disabled friends. Adapted physical education provides opportunities for USDB children to raise their self-esteem and feel as if they can succeed in life.

USDB has witnessed many successes with implementation of this new program. Children's sensory needs have been met, with the development of better communication and problem solving skills, fears have been conquered and sportsmanship gained. Children have also learned to share, made new friends, and learned how to work well and play with others. Students who previously struggled with basic loco motor and gross motor skills have been able to catch up with their peers as well. School is about children succeeding, and this program helps make that happen for many USDB students.

Some of the sports that USDB kids now are able to play include goalball, basketball,

volleyball, hockey, bowling, soccer, kickball, and tag. Many of the children are learning to run and ride bicycles!

For those who are blind, sounds are used to help identify directions or objects. The USDB PE teacher adapts these sports to meet student needs in various ways:

- Basketball is adapted with a jingle bell basketball, beepers, or canes used to identify the basket.
- Volleyball is adapted with a big beach ball with bells attached or a ball designed to make a crunching sound as it is hit.
- Hockey is played with padded hockey sticks and a ball that rattles.
- Bowling is played with pins that make noise or a music box behind the bowling pins.
- Running is taught with a sighted guide or a rope to follow.







- Baseball games are played with a beeping baseball and bases that emit different tones.
- Kickball can be played like beep baseball or with ropes that lead from base to base with a jingling bell ball.
- Soccer is played with a rattle ball and soccer nets that make noise.
- And...<u>Tag</u> is played with every person having a jingle bell or a noisemaker to be able to find somebody else - just like Marco Polo in the pool!

For those who are deaf, the sports are played as usual, but flags and off/on lights can be used to get attention or to start or stop a game.

For students with multiple disabilities or those who use walkers or wheelchairs, adaptions are made according to their disabilities. Students in walkers or wheelchairs can use ramps to help roll balls, or game balls are made a little bigger for easier handling.

Along with working on typical sports, the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the Blind offer recreational activities such as riding a tandem bicycle, hiking, walking, running, and other life sports.

Because of the help from Phi Eta Sigma, the attitude of these children is now: "Life's too short to sit on the side lines; play the games you were meant to play!"


Penn State Scholar "Models" Efficiency in Scientific Research

e love to hear about the ventures our Phi Eta Sigma alumni pursue after graduation. In the case of Tiffany Bogich, she's been very busy. Tiffany graduated in 2006 from The Pennsylvania State University, where she majored in both ecology and mathematics and minored in biology. She was very active in Phi Eta Sigma for three years, serving as chapter secretary, president, senior adviser, and regional chairperson. Tiffany exhibited great leadership and made my job as chapter adviser very easy. Under her leadership we expanded our social work in the community.

Tiffany attended the 2004 national convention, and in 2005 she was selected to serve on the national Executive Committee as an ad hoc student member to assist with the 2006 national convention. She also served as chairperson for the 2003 Penn State Regional Hoopla Conference that involved participants from seven Phi Eta Sigma chapters. She was the recipient of the Thomas Arkle Clark Endowed Graduate Scholarship from Phi Eta Sigma in 2005-2006. Tiffany was featured in the 2006 Forum article, "EPA Honors Penn State Student as a Rising 'Star' in Environmental Science." The article described her award from the EPA, the Science to Achieve Results (STAR) fellowship in support of her research on "Optimization of the Monitoring and Management of the North American Gypsy Moth."

I think her first love has always been the outdoors. She took mountain climbing very seriously. Tiffany describes herself as "an applied

mathematician, self-trained programmer with newfound love of javascript and github, and an affinity for rock climbing."

During her undergraduate career, Tiffany was an exceptional student and a Schreyer Honors College scholar. She made Penn State very proud by being awarded a Gates Cambridge Scholarship, a global scholarship for intellectually outstanding postgraduate students with a capacity for leadership and a commitment to improving the lives of others. The program was established in 2000 by a donation from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to the University of Cambridge in the United Kingdom. Ninety scholarships are awarded each year: 40 in the U.S. and 50 from other countries outside the U.K. Tiffany earned a Ph.D. in zoology from the University of Cambridge. In addition to her rigorous studies, she participated in University cricket and rugby.

Tiffany and I have maintained close contact since her graduation. She travels all over the world - I know as I get photos from her excursions. Her resume includes a variety of impressive companies and positions. She worked as a visiting research fellow at the Zoological Society of London for two years. She did research in conservation biology at Cambridge University, with nine months of fieldwork in New Zealand studying biodiversity patterns under habitat loss. Then she worked as a senior research scientist at EcoHealth Alliance researching the macroecology of emerging diseases, developing methods for the smart surveillance of key hosts and habitats. She also managed interns and junior scientists working specifically on the USAID PREDICT project as part of the Emerging Pandemic Threats Program. At Columbia University in New York City, she was an adjunct faculty member.

Currently in the last year of her postdoctoral research, Tiffany works as a RAPIDD (Research and Policy for Infectious Disease Dynamics) Fellow with the National Institutes of Health, Fogarty International Center, based at Princeton University. She uses mathematical models to help develop control strategies for infectious

diseases (like Hand Foot and Mouth Disease - a childhood infection that can cause severe disease and sometimes death in young children). Her research has been published in multiple medical publications.

Tiffany, along with her partners Sebastien Ballesteros and Joseph Dureau, recently started a business by creating an online database to make model-based science readily available so that decision-makers, health practitioners, and even the general public can interface with the latest scientific results when trying to make decisions regarding health or health issues. The company is called PLOM.IO, The Public Library of Models, and the website is http://plom.io.

The purpose of scientific modeling is to create a conceptual representation of some phenomenon. PLOM.IO makes scientific modeling social, building communities around problems and using models to find solutions. The concept is very new but was accepted to the Mozilla Foundation WebFWD program. The WebFWD

program is a 3-month hands-on accelerator designed to help entrepreneurs from around the globe build healthy businesses. PLOM.IO is an open-source, online company developing data streaming APIs, an interactive platform for collaboration, and a library of prior knowledge, scientific models, and results, with the aim of changing the way science is done and changing the way decisions are made. According to the website, "As three recovering academics, we created PLOM.IO out of a need in our own work and a frustration with the current system for sharing science and interacting with policy makers on time-sensitive questions. We believe

that we have the technology to do better. We believe it's time to change the way we do science, and further, it's time to change the way we make decisions."

Tiffany is one of Penn State's very remarkable graduates. She was very dedicated to Phi Eta Sigma, and we grew in size and in our escrow fund. The chapter now gives six \$1,250 scholarships each year. This is possible, in large part, because of her leadership. Both Penn State and Phi Eta Sigma are happy to have had her as one of our students. We really appreciate Tiffany and the distinguished Phi Eta Sigma alumni members who keep us posted on their activities.

Mrs. Powell explained how being a member of Phi Eta Sigma can be beneficial for students while in college, as well as in the future. She also discussed the history of the Phi Eta Sigma national philanthropy project and shared information on this year's project: WINGS for Kids, an educational program that teaches children how to behave well, make good decisions, and build healthy relationships. Following the community service project, the attendees were introduced to a panel of UWGB Alumni: Emma Bretl, Amy Zellner, and Katie VonHolzen, who video-chatted from Germany. The panel members, all of whom served as Phi Eta Sigma officers and were Society scholarship recipients, shared their Phi Eta Sigma experiences and how the honor society benefited them both in college and in their professional careers. Then they fielded questions from the conference attendees regarding their Phi Eta Sigma involvement and provided advice on strengthening the chapters.

While having lunch together before departing, the group made plans to stay in contact and continue sharing ideas and advice. The students even created a Facebook page; check it out at Phi Eta Sigma MARC. All in all, the Midwest Area Regional Conference was a huge success. It provided attendees with new ideas and techniques for strengthening each of their chapters, as well as helping to build new friendships.



outhern charm, history and culture, marine life and coastal beauty-All of these terms apply to magnificent Charleston, South Carolina, which is the setting for the Phi Eta Sigma National Convention and Leadership Workshops scheduled for October 10-12, 2014. The host hotel for this event is the beautiful and spacious **Embassy** Suites Charleston Area Convention Center. The convention theme, "Power in Knowledge: Excellence Taking Flight," reflects the focus of the 2014 national philanthropy to benefit after-school programs across the nation, especially the WINGS for Kids program in the Charleston area.

As you arrive at the Charleston airport and at Embassy Suites on Friday afternoon, members of the host committee from the College of Charleston Phi Eta Sigma chapter will greet you and direct you to the convention registration and hospitality center. There you can enjoy some refreshments, share any materials you brought from your chapter for display (photos, scrapbooks, posters, promotional items, etc.), and examine displays from other chapters. You may even wish to participate in the newest convention event, a student quiz bowl that will test your knowledge of Phi Eta Sigma facts, as well as your general academic skills.

After a wonderful buffet dinner Friday evening, the first official business session will convene, followed by the organization of the two Society administrative committees: the Constitution and Scholarship Committee and the Nominations Committee. If you do not serve on a convention committee, select one of the roundtable discussions for brainstorming topics of special interest to Phi Eta Sigma chapter advisers and members.

The Friday evening activities will conclude with one of our most popular convention events, the ice cream social and gift exchange. This is a wonderful opportunity for advisers and members to meet new friends in an informal setting and to share various items from their respective chapters and campuses. Some of the promotional items that have been exchanged at previous conventions include pens and pencils, stickers and decals, t-shirts and caps, cups and water bottles, beads, magnets, buttons, wristbands, and many more. So feel free to be creative in what you bring to swap with members from other chapters. You may be surprised at what you will take away from the event.

The Saturday morning agenda begins with breakfast at the hotel buffet, where you can choose from hearty items like breakfast potatoes, eggs, and bacon; lighter choices like fruit, oatmeal, and pastries; or a cooked-to-order omelet. You may even choose to grab something convenient to take with you into the morning business session. Following that meeting, members of the Executive Committee will

present workshops on a variety of topics related to personal development, leadership skills, and chapter enrichment. Each workshop will be offered twice, so you will have the opportunity to attend two different sessions. Committee meetings and roundtable discussions will follow the workshop sessions. The Saturday awards luncheon will feature the presentation of a number of individual and chapter awards, as well as the presentation of our philanthropy check to the WINGS after-school program and recognition of the chapters participating in this year's philanthropy project.

Be sure to bring comfortable shoes and casual clothes for changing after lunch, because we will take a break from Society business to visit historic downtown Charleston and the beautiful Carolina coast. The outing will conclude at the South Carolina Aquarium, where our group will experience Charleston from a different point of view. Enjoy a cocktail-style dinner of fantastic Carolina cuisine at your own pace, explore up to 60 marine exhibits of more than 10,000 living organisms, view a dive show, and even dance to music from a DJ if you like. Throughout the evening, an educator from the aquarium will be available to allow interaction with live animals. Upon returning to the hotel, convention committees will conclude their work if necessary and prepare their final reports.

On Sunday morning, be sure to fill up on a hearty breakfast at the hotel to hold you throughout the morning. The final business session will include reports from the convention committees and the election of the Grand President and Grand Historian, plus one at-large chapter adviser member and three student members of the Executive Committee. The democratic governance of the Society is one of its strongest assets, allowing student leaders to exchange insights and make decisions to ensure a prosperous future for Phi Eta Sigma.

As you prepare for your chapter's participation at the 2014 convention, remember that this biennial event is a means for you to enrich the lives of academically motivated students at campuses all across the nation through recognition, scholarships, and leadership and service opportunities. 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Call for Philanthropy Efforts - from the Student Members of the Executive Committee

Greetings Fellow Members of Phi Eta Sigma:

What a privilege and an honor it is for me and the two other student delegates, Sarah Fortney and Sean Freeman, to serve as your representatives on the Phi Eta Sigma Executive Committee! We are proud of the work we have done so far and are excited about all we expect to accomplish over the next several months, especially in anticipation of the upcoming national convention.

In 2009-2010 Phi Eta Sigma embarked on a new project encouraging members to become more involved in philanthropic efforts. The next Phi Eta Sigma National Convention and Leadership Workshops will be held October 10-12, 2014, in Charleston, South Carolina. As we consider the convention theme, "Power in Knowledge: Excellence Taking Flight," we as Phi Eta Sigma members have the opportunity to assess our special abilities and resources and to make a difference in the lives of elementary school students in the Charleston area.

WINGS for Kids will be the beneficiary of this year's philanthropy project. Serving at-risk elementary school students with an after school program for more than fifteen years, WINGS provides a way for all kids in the Charleston area to develop social and emotional skills. The children are given the foundation to be successful in life and will have the opportunity to live "joyfully, powerfully and responsibly" after being exposed to this program. Over the years, services provided by WINGS have continued to meet the changing needs of the students and families who live below the poverty line in Charleston. These services, provided at no cost to the families, include offering group activities to build vocabulary and social interactions, providing interactions that will build decision-making skills, having all students spend time in an academic center where homework assistance is provided, exposing the children to the value of community service to encourage pride and self-confidence, and many more valuable life experiences.

Regardless of convention attendance, every Phi Eta Sigma chapter can be represented at the 2014 convention by being involved in this worthy philanthropy effort. We encourage all chapters to hold one or more events this year to raise awareness of the growing difficulty for children who live in poverty and to raise funds for the WINGS for Kids program. You may also find a program in your local community that provides similar services, so your fundraising could be a joint effort to benefit both the local program and WINGS.

Convention News

When you hold your chapter fundraising events, be sure to document your efforts with photos, newsletters, local media coverage, etc. Submit a brief description of your efforts, along with photos and other documentation, to the national office by the fall deadline (to be announced later) in order to be entered in the competition for best philanthropy. The student Executive Committee members will review both the philanthropy project descriptions and the amounts raised, and we will select the chapter we feel has best exemplified the spirit of Phi Eta Sigma in this effort. The "best philanthropy" will be honored at the 2014 convention awards luncheon, and all project entries will be recognized. A check for the total funds raised will also be presented to a representative of WINGS for Kids during the luncheon.

Phi Eta Sigma has a proud tradition of excellence, leadership, and service. At the 2014 national convention, Phi Eta Sigma members will again have the opportunity to meet and share ideas with fellow members from across the country and to make decisions affecting the future of one of the most prestigious collegiate honor societies in the nation. But you don't need to wait until next fall for your chapter to have an impact. Begin now by organizing events that will engage your chapter members in leadership development and service projects. Distinguished Service Awards

How to Nominate Candidates for Distinguished Service Awards

he Executive Committee of Phi Eta Sigma calls to your attention the procedures for nominating individuals for the Distinguished Service Award and encourages members to nominate worthy candidates. Statute VIII of the Constitution and Laws outlines qualifications and procedures:

Statute VIII - Distinguished Service Awards

Section 1. Members, chapter advisers, Executive Committee members, or national office staff members of Phi Eta Sigma who have given loyal and devoted service to the Society for a period of not less than five years may be recognized with the Distinguished Service Award, to be presented at the National Convention.

Section 2. Nominations may be made to the Executive Director at least three months prior to the date of the National Convention, by the officers of a local chapter, present and past members of the Executive Committee, former recipients of the Distinguished Service Award, or university officials at institutions where Phi Eta Sigma chapters are located.

Section 3. From candidates duly nominated, the recipient(s) will be selected by the Distinguished Service Award Committee of three members, appointed by the Grand President, to include one member of the Executive Committee, one previous recipient of the award, and one member at large.
